

a) The location of resources can affect employment for many groups because of the need, access to services. Independence is important as it determines how the individual feels about themselves. A sense of identity is important to the 'aged' because they need to feel loved and wanted. They need to be able to feel they are useful. This will give them a positive self-concept of themselves. The aged are the same as any other individual except for they have more knowledge and experience and are good to have in communities.

c) Equality is important in ~~determining~~ the Australian society and there are many management strategies in which the government addresses these equity issues.

The 'Aged' and the 'homeless' have a lot of stereotyping and disadvantages in society. 'Aged' people are portrayed as 'too old' and it can be disheartening for some individuals that find themselves in the category of 'the aged', to have this disadvantage passed to them. 'Homeless' people on the other hand are known to be of societies poorest. ~~This~~ This group of individuals do not live with adequate housing, food and sometimes clothing. They are

disadvantaged in society as they may lack in skills and education which they may need for employment. The 'Aged' and the 'homeless' have one thing in common, they have the same rights as any other individual under the Australian constitution. Management strategies used to address equity issues is laws have been put into place so that no individual can be discriminated against. Government has Government funding agencies such as SAAP (The Supported Accommodation Assistance Program) and CAP (Crisis Accommodation Program) for homeless people to access to help, Centrelink ^{and housing} is available for both the 'aged' and the 'homeless'. The 'aged' ~~can also~~ ^{has} ~~can be~~ government organisations such as ACATs which helps those who fit under the 'aged' category who need access to services and whose needs are not being met physically, socially and psychologically. The Government also has benefits for the 'aged' such as pensions to assist in necessities and for both groups counselling is

accessible.
