### TEXT 1

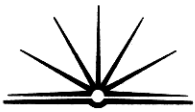
ai - One change that is mentioned in the song lyric

ii - Two techniques that are used to convey the ideas in the song are rhyming verse and use of flash backs.

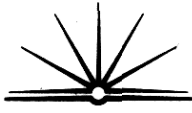
Rhyming verse gives the song a swing and helps the responder move quickly through the song, emphasising the rate of change.

The flash backs are used in the choruses to make the responder really think and examine the changes that have taken place.



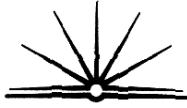
## TEXT 2

d- The website represents the effects of change in the Inuit way of life by giving the viewer the information about their change in the format that was fueled, and been the cause of their change.

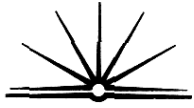
The change in the Inuit's way of life was brought a "collision between old and new" as the internet, computers and generally advances in technology have met with the peoples' traditions that have been around for many years.

For a CD-ROM entitled Past, Present, Future? that aims to educate students about change, it would be necessary to include information on all three aspects, and how they relate to change. For this reason I believe that texts three and four are good examples of different types of change, how change occurs, and how change relates to the past, present and future.

Text three represents the natural change that occurs in the environment and, all of life. It's metaphorical look at the change of a single cicada allows students to explore change on a single level, but also on a much deeper level of what the past was, what the present is and what the future may hold in the inevitable cycle of change that happens to each of us.



TEXT FOUR represents a different aspect of change, that of humans and technological advances. The use of a website bluntly explores, and makes students aware of, the rapid advances of technology in the modern era. The fact that the website is commenting on ~~an~~ a people whose culture and tradition has been around for many years, further highlights these technological changes. However it also brings to the students' attention, the change and advances in ~~the~~ the human race. This is especially evident in the paragraph beginning "The collision between old and new has sometimes been disastrous..." making students aware that while the Inuits did not have the same technology as others in the rapidly advancing world, their culture and traditions were destroyed. However, after adopting the technology, the Inuits have been able to "regain control over ancestral lands" and the internet has been able to "help strengthen their community and build economic independence."
