Question 12 — Design (10 marks)	

- (a) Identify ONE historical development for ONE focus area, and describe the influence of the historical development on textile design in contemporary society. 2

Apparel - Corset - Common style of bodice characterising old 1800's / contemporary clothing joined to skirt on female dresses. Influenced design esp. formal wear - strapless bodices fitted to body (or with straps) maintaining similar characteristics of corset - also used incorporated into western wedding costumes or designer wear. e.g. range produced by Vivienne Westwood early 90's featuring corset bodices on a mini-skirt.

- (b) Describe the method of decoration called *appliqu*. 2

Appliqu involves attaching an image or design on a base fabric - first step involves ironing double sided interfacing to wrong side of image - peeling interfacing off to leave sticky surface, placing image onto desired area and sticking on. Using machine, applique involves either machine-stitching around image to secure firmly and/or stitching with another method that will secure image and decorate.

- (c) Identify a specific culture you have studied.

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- (i) Describe TWO design features of textile items typical of this culture.

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Loose & styled clothing - predominate hot / dry climate influencing need for air circulation for comfort. Mainly breathable, e.g. light-weight cotton. Heavy decorations - Variety of techniques including dyeing, beading, embroidery, applique, tassels / fringes to add beauty to design.

- (ii) Explain how these design features have influenced contemporary textile design.

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1. Loose clothing reflected in contemporary imitation of sari-like designs - a loose fitted top (commonly cotton) combined with loose pants and cotton shawl / scarf. Reflected in summer wear - really loose light-weight cotton shirts for men / women in adaptation of heat and associated summer weather.

2. Decoration - incorporated into contemporary design of both apparel & non-apparel items - beading, mirrorwork on bags / tassels / fringes on skirts / pants / jeans formal & casual wear particularly in Australian fashion in 1999 and 2000. Beading and

dyeing techniques commonly incorporated into beachy - summer wear or beads in formal wear to give intricacy and delicacy.
