Monet's intention in producing his artwork 'Water Lilies', was to depict light on the surface of the objects within his work.

Monet, beginning the era of Impressionism, painted a realistic view of a bridge over a stream, filled with lilies. Monet's incredible brush strokes, in defined detail, depicted this scene realistically, because of his intention to use light. If Monet hadn't used light on the surface of the objects within the work, the painting would not have been realistic, therefore all intentions lost and would not have been such a famous painting to begin with. This is why Monet had to intend to paint it this way to begin with.



Marcel Duchamps 'ready-made', bicycle wheel, had been readily thought about before production. Duchamp wanted to shock the world and to this, he intended to take two already produced everyday items, put them together and call it art. In Andy Warhol's pop-art, Warhol also wanted to create a new meaning for 'art'. Warhol, collected consumer day items, used them in his work, with the intention to completely change the meaning of them. In 'green coca-cola bottles', Warhol, using a silk screen, traced coca-cola bottles repeatedly, changed these everyday food

items, into a symbol of the mass production of these popular items. Warhol challenged the audience to re-think about these bottles, thus being his intention.

As technology had grown largely by the end of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, Jill Scott decided to use technology within art. Her intentions were different to others, which has brought her fame.

In her work, 'paradise tossed,' she used an installation to depict four women in different generations, bringing forth her intention to the freedom of women within society. She brought upon a new production with art, which is important because it has widened the artmaking practise.

Throughout the years, depending upon culture and meaning, the production of artworks has had their own intentions. In the first Century BC in Egypt, hieroglyphics and symbolism was used to portray their meaning of their Pharaoh, while also later on many depictions of Christ, by example Raphael, which had the intention to spread religion, being successful. By the 15<sup>th</sup> Century, Renaissance became popular, moving into a different kind of architecture, with the use of repetition and arches. All intentions were due to culture and to change usual ways of doing things.

Also in the 15<sup>th</sup> Century, Jan van Eyk had given the world

a very realistic portrayal of "the Arnolfini marriage". Eyk used light and realistic brushstrokes, such as the wood grain floor and the dogs hair, to show the audience a detailed picture of a marriage in that point of time. Eyk also intended to use objects that represent marriage, such as the dog, for fidelity.

Rembrandt was also an artist, who intended to paint portraits of himself to give the audience an autobiography of himself throughout his life. His used realistic brushstrokes with warm paint, all so the audience is able to feel what he is feeling and thinking at that point in his life.
