'Evaluate the view that art reflects the social values of a particular time and place.'

Art often reflects the social values of a particular time and place and is usually subject to the artist's personal view of the values and their reaction to them. The Post Modern art movement particularly reveals this through especially in works from artists such as Yasumasa Morimura, Jeff Koons, Barbara Kruger and Stelarc, who reflect such social values as ethnicity, popular culture, feminism and technology respectively in their artworks.

Breaking away from such traditions as the 'male dominated western world' artists, Yasumasa Morimura expresses his opinions towards art through the such traditions in his artwork. Born in Japan, Morimura embraces his ethnicity in his artworks, known as Postmodern identity, he is able to explore his transnationality through such works as Daughter of Art history Theatre A (1989). Not only does this

look at the ~~aspects~~ multicultural world which is present today but also explores issues of gender, as Morimura is dressed and in the place of a woman, which are also prominent social values of the Western world especially America, where Morimura lives.

Jeff Koons is a postmodern artist who looks at the social values surrounding pop culture and mass production in modern times. Such works as 'Bunny' (1993) challenge ~~the~~ today's dependency on pop culture and mass production. This work uses humor, parody and wit to express the artist's views on these values. The artist

uses the image of a plastic bunny to humorously ~~proves~~ comment on the loss of aesthetic appeal through mass production and stagnant appeal through popular culture. Koons also produces works such as 'Puppy' (1992 (Germany)) to comment on art in a modern society. His work puppy is an attempt to explore the role of the artist, ~~Hank~~ Koons' role in this work, however minimal, still credits him. ~~for~~

The arrival of feminism as a result of postmodernism also reflects the social values of modern time dating back to the 1980's. A new sense of freedom for women was

found & during the rise of post-modernism and created, especially in art, strong views on the stereotypical image of woman and equality between the sexes. Barbra Krugers work 'Your Body is a Battleground' (1989) (1989 used in abortion rally) expresses the artists values and views towards abortion. Kruger use an appropriation from a 1950's advertisement of a woman which portrays the image of a stereotypical woman, often seen as correct. The work Your body is a battleground was Krugers reflection of the social views surrounding abortion. At the time of its use, the work was part of a rally which protested

against the governments attempts to make abortion illegal in America. The work is a representation of a view social view which is held not only by Kruger but many other people of the time. The ~~modern~~ post modern art movement also gave rise to the exploration and celebration of technology. Artists such as Stelarc embraced this concept and used it to create art which reflects the social values concerning rapidly improving and enhanced technology. Stelarc's creation of the third arm for example is his response to the celebration of technology which is an inevitable part of today's modern society.

Stelarc uses performance to present his work, this non-traditional form enhances the reflection of his opinion towards technology. It also promotes change from traditional methods of art making and art practice, which comment on the social values of Stelarc's towards technology and its acceptance by today's society reflected by his success as an artist.

By looking at the works of these artists it is evident that the social values of the artists especially, but also of the general public are greatly reflect through their works. We are able to
